SEPT 2024

Inclusive Pedagogical Practices Workshop using an Ecological Approach

The workshop, held on September 13, 2024, explored how an ecological model could transform teaching practices and foster inclusive, studentcentered education. Participants reflected on strengths, identified growth areas, and collaborated on strategies for change.

Recognizing & Responding to Students in Distress

This workshop, held on September 17, 2024, focused on how to use the Compassionate Guide to recognize when a student is struggling and understand the appropriate next steps in the context of your role.

Using Hypothes.is Annotation Software to Engage Students in Readings and Discussion.

This workshop, held on September 27, 2024, explored using Hypothes.is annotation software to boost student engagement in classroom discussions. The tool allows students to collaboratively annotate readings, share perspectives, and ask questions in a supportive environment. This approach encourages participation, ensures accountability for completing readings, and enhances in-class discussions.

Nov 2024

Cultivating Constructive Dialogue: special session on Election.

This workshop, held on November 1, 2024, focused on fostering constructive dialogue around the 2024 presidential election. It provided strategies for creating low-stakes opportunities for students to express viewpoints, engage in respectful discourse, and enhance communication skills in both curricular and co-curricular settings.

How to Plan Field Trips to the Beinecke Library and Yale Center for British Art.

This workshop, held on November 8, 2024, featured Anna Franz and James Vanderberg, who discussed scheduling field trips and making object requests at their institutions. They also shared faculty examples of using collections in courses. The session concluded with funding information for faculty seeking support for field trips, presented by facilitator Lauren Boass.

Begin With the Results: How Assessment-Informed Teaching Can Improve Learning in the Classroom

This workshop, held on November 12, 2024, focused on how starting with desired outcomes can improve course design. Participants explored how assessment practices can inform teaching and enhance student success.

OCT 2024

Digital Solutions to "Chalk Talk" Lectures in Scientific Writing

This workshop, held on October 3, 2024, showcased a digital solution for scientific writing, combining open-source software and standard hardware. It offered features like archival, recording, enhanced visibility, and inclusivity for color-blind students, providing a sustainable, cost-effective alternative to whiteboards.

Digital Solutions to "Chalk Talk" Lectures in Scientific Writing

This workshop, held on October 11, 2024, introduced Problem-Based Learning (PBL) to enhance student engagement through real-world problems. Participants explored PBL design, reviewed examples, and worked on adapting their own courses or projects.

Academic Service-Learning: WTH is it and What is its Past, Present, and Future at UNH?

This workshop, held on October 25, 2024, introduced Academic Service-Learning at UNH. Dr. Melissa Whitson shared findings from her fellowship, highlighting challenges, best practices, and recommendations to enhance service-learning.

Bringing Microcredentials to UNewHaven

This workshop, held on October 29, 2024, introduced microcredentials and electronic badges, highlighting their growing importance in education and industry. It covered their role in the UNH Strategic Plan, current policies for non-credit micros, and plans for credit-bearing micros.

NOV 2024

Going Public with Our Teaching: The Scholarship of Teaching and Learning (SoTL)

This workshop, held on November 22, 2024, introduced the Scholarship of Teaching and Learning (SoTL) and its role in advancing teaching practices. Participants learned strategies and resources for designing and publishing SoTL projects.

DEC 2024

Making productive use of negotiation for conflict resolution: A brief introduction to tools, concepts, and practice

This workshop, held on December 6, 2024, provided participants with an understanding of basic concepts and tools for managing conflict more productively. Attendees had the opportunity to apply these tools to conflicts they wished to explore further.
